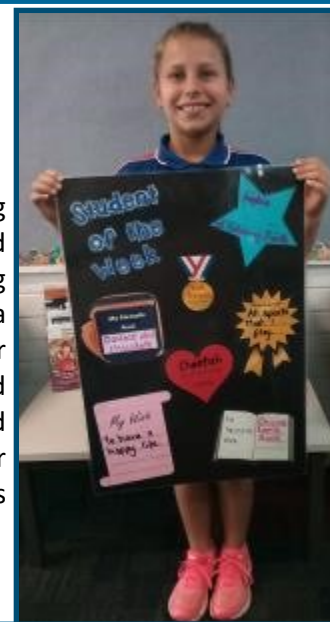

### In Pursuit of Empathy

Positive social behaviour and emotional intelligence imply a complex weave of virtuous behaviour of which the central thread is empathy. A great many of the inappropriate, hurtful, damaging and anti-social behaviour that blights communities is attributable to a lack of empathy. Empathy can be fostered in children with great success the earlier we start and the longer we sustain the process. Woven into the fabric of our morning games, yarning circles and language we use at school is the development of empathy.

Empathy is much talked about and too often, sadly, we are most conscious of it when it's absent. The lack of empathy is most obvious in schools where acts of cruelty, commonly termed bullying, are prevalent. Although the word 'empathy' is often used and a trait much admired, it is not easy to define. If we want our children to have empathy they must first have a clear idea of what it is: "An awareness of another. The ability to see things from another person's point of view. The ability to identify with the plight, state or needs of another" (Wilson McCaskill).

There is a complication with this definition in that it suggests an inner state of consciousness with no specific external responses. In being so, it would appear hard to determine a person's degree of empathy. Empathy, being a virtue, needs to become an entrenched habit of action, yet the definition makes it hard to determine what those habits of action are. Empathy can be seen as a composite virtue, where we see it in the other virtues:

- When a child doesn't interrupt and waits to speak (Good Manners).
- When a child doesn't deliberately hurt other people's feelings or bodies (Friendliness).
- When a child listens to their conscience and acts accordingly (Courage).
- When a child respects the rights and traditions of others (Tolerance).
- When a child helps another in difficulty (Compassion).

It is our role as teachers and role models in children's lives to be good examples of the virtues. In doing so, we will lead our children and community by our actions and deeds.
